The regular meeting of the Rose Hill City Council was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Mayor Steve Huckaby. Councilmembers present, Ross Chappell, Beth Pompa Bill Baker, Gary Weaver and Rachel Wright. Administration and staff present: Kelly Mendoza, Interim City Administrator/City Clerk, Nelson Mosley, Police Chief, Dillan Curtis, Public Works Superintendent and Andrew Marino, City Attorney.

Invocation and Flag Salute

Pastor Rob Frazier, Rose Hill Victory Fellowship Church gave the invocation, followed by the flag salute.

There were none.

Approval of minutes

Councilmember Chappell made motion to approve the minutes of 03/19/18 and 03/26/18 as presented, seconded by Weaver. Motion carried 5-0.

Approval of claims

Councilmember Weaver made motion to approve appropriation #7, seconded by Pompa. Motion carried 5-0.

Approval of agenda

Program Purpose

To help meet the current and anticipated future need for walkable place-making in the WAMPO region with a focused program that will promote vibrancy, community, and economic vitality today and over the long term.

Planning Walkable Places is a grant program for non-construction planning projects.

Objectives

- Create pilot projects that can be evaluated by all member jurisdictions and members of the public.
- Enhance community identity by helping to create core areas and Main Streets with distinctive characteristics.
- Promote pedestrian safety.
- Enhance or restore the character and charm of traditionally walkable areas.
- Support a "sense of community" in small and large cities.
- Provide a reasonable opportunity for participation for all WAMPO members.
- Enhance the quality of community of events and help keep up with rapidly increasing rates of attendance.
- Support efforts to enhance economic vitality and tourism that rely on foot traffic for attractions and retail.

Example Eligible Activities List

- Projects will likely include multiple activities and may involve different stages of the
 planning process. Any project may include one or several of the following elements. This
 list is not intended to be exhaustive.
- Development of design standards or design guidelines that promote walkable streets and land development.
- Development of zoning overlays that will encourage/work with walking as a primary mode of transportation (Historic District, Arts District, Downtown, etc.).
- Downtown or Main Street rehabilitation studies that aim at restoring walkability to an area or street where it was once prominent.
- Educational programs for enhancing pedestrian safety and awareness.
- Walkability audits or accessibility studies that assess existing conditions, identifying needs
 and barriers; any other types of inventories or surveys that emphasize walkability;
 identification of candidate areas for improving walkability.
- Development of Active Transportation plans that may also incorporate bicycling.
- Corridor studies or plans that emphasize walkability.
- Citizen/stakeholder participation activities such as surveys or facilitated events that will inform the planning of walkable places.
- Tourism or economic development studies or plans that emphasize walkability.

- Parking plans or studies that develop different parking scenarios for areas where walkability is important.
- Transit studies in which the walk portion of transit is prominent or which include a
 placemaking element, such as a Transit Oriented Development (TOD) plan.
- Development of Safe Routes to School-type plans or design guidelines to make walking to school practical and safe.
- Creation of pedestrian plans for activity centers such as event venues, schools, or employment centers.
- Studies or planning that will create/identify areas where walking/foot traffic will enhance the local economy.
- Traffic calming studies.
- Other planning components such as market assessment, exploring financing options, creating multi-year phasing plans with associated costs.
- Pedestrian plans for connecting activity centers.

Ineligible Activities

- Preliminary Engineering
- Right of Way acquisition
- Utility Relocation
- Construction
- Any plans or studies that do not specify a connection with walking/walkability

Eligible Recipients

All member jurisdictions are eligible to compete for projects. At this time, non-profit organizations and school districts are not eligible.

Please Note: Member jurisdictions may apply for and be awarded multiple projects.

Public Participation

A public participation process is a required element of all federally funded projects.

Considerations

Because rapidly rising attendance at special events has been identified as a regional pedestrian concern, projects aimed at improving pedestrian accommodations in and around community event areas will be receive first consideration.

Safety is a priority for the region, and proposals that incorporate pedestrian safety elements will receive added consideration.

Although the conceptual planning of individual facilities such as shared use paths and sidewalks may qualify for funding, the real intent of this program is placemaking. As such, proposals that consider the connection between the built environment and transportation to create walkable places will receive added consideration.

Proposed projects that enhance, support, or integrate with a larger community plan will receive added consideration.

Proposed projects should support and enhance local context such as historic character.

Requirements

In order to receive funding, a proposed project must meet ALL of the following criteria:

- Proposed by an eligible project sponsor (a WAMPO member jurisdiction)
- The project sponsor clearly explains how the proposed project will enhance walkability, if it is not evident
- The proposed project includes a meaningful public involvement process
- The proposal does NOT include ineligible activities (listed above)
- Local matching funds for 20 percent of the project's total cost must be available

Project sponsors that do not meet all criteria will be given an opportunity to review and amend their proposals; those that cannot meet all criteria by the deadline will not be awarded funds.

Policies

Funds may only be used for the project described in the application. Funds are awarded to the project, not the jurisdiction.

Significant changes to a project's scope of work after award will need formal approval by WAMPO. Any work done on a project that does not conform to the project description is not eligible for reimbursement. Minor changes may not require a formal process – please contact WAMPO with any questions.

No additional federal funds are promised for cost increases after the initial award is made.

All project sponsors will need to adhere to the Kansas Department of Transportation's consultant procurement process. This assures compliance with federal and state policies. WAMPO staff will assist in meeting these requirements.

Although WAMPO staff will assist project sponsors at certain stages of the process, WAMPO's policy will be to ensure that control and management of all projects remains with the project sponsor to the maximum extent practical.

If a federal award exceeds \$100,000, the awardee will need to pay a 1% TIP fee to WAMPO.

Review Committee

The committee will meet 2-3 times during the summer months to provide feedback and helpful suggestions to project sponsors and to ensure that proposed projects meet requirements. The Committee will assist in prioritizing/recommending projects for funds if funding is not adequate for all proposed projects.

WAMPO staff will conduct communications with the project sponsors. Staff will also help to ensure that proposals meet all requirements.

Funding

In accordance with federal policy, a project may receive a maximum of 80 percent of its funds from WAMPO programs. A 20 percent local match will need to be provided by the project

sponsor. Projects may be funded below the 80 percent maximum if the Review Committee recommends a different level of federal funding.

Visual Guide Planning Walkable Places Program

The Visual Guide for the Planning Walkable Places Program should be used as a tool for exploring some of the more commonly featured project types. Please be aware, this guide should not be considered an exclusive list! Many other activities may be eligible.

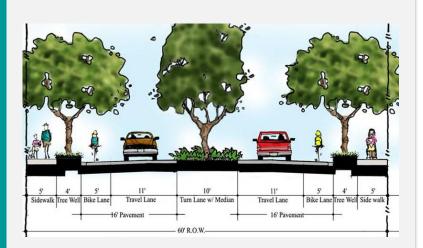
Planning Walkable Places is a grant program for non-construction planning projects with walkability as a primary focus. All WAMPO member jurisdictions are encouraged to apply.

Eligible Activities: include conceptual designs, plans, studies, development of standards and guidelines, surveys and assessments, public involvement activities, accessories like wayfinding signage and lighting (with some restrictions).

Ineligible Activities: include construction, preliminary engineering, projects that do not specify a connection with walkability/pedestrian transportation.

Requirements: 20 percent local matching funds, a public involvement process, and adherence to KDOT's procurement process for consultants (WAMPO staff will help with this part!)

Timeline: the calendar consists of a call for projects in mid-May and culminates with award announcements in August, followed by consultant selection in the Fall of 2017.





Downtown, Area, or Corridor Plans



General Scope:

Produce a plan for developing or redeveloping a defined subarea of a city, often a downtown, to create an environment that promotes and enhances walking. The scope likely includes the following tasks:

- Collect and analyze existing conditions (physical, demographic, socioeconomic, market...)
- Identify desired future conditions, goals, and objectives
- Identify opportunities and barriers
- Develop land use and development recommendations
- Develop infrastructure recommendations (transportation, streetscape, etc.)
- Create design standards
- Develop planning level cost estimates
- Prioritize recommendations and develop an implementation plan with funding options
- Stakeholder and public engagement

General Cost Range:

Costs will vary depending upon the size of the area or corridor, the existing development complexity, the amount of detail desired from the recommendations (from verbiage to concept drawings), the amount of stakeholder and public engagement, and data availability.

General costs for the scope items listed above should range from about \$30K to \$100K or more.



Safe Routes to Schools Plans



General Scope:

Produce a plan to improve pedestrian safety for school children at or near a school. May include bicycling as well. The scope likely includes the following tasks:

- Collect data on enrollment, bus routes, bus policies, school policies and programs, crash data, traffic volumes, etc.
- Conduct a school audit and assess existing conditions of infrastructure and human behaviors before and after school
- Develop, conduct, and summarize the results of a parent survey and a student survey
- Conduct a walking audit workshop and neighborhood meeting

- Identify development types and conditions related to pedestrian activity
- Pedestrian crash data analysis
- Identify desired future conditions, goals, and objectives
- Identify trip origins, destinations, and missing connections
- Identify physical, sociological, and regulatory barriers
- Identify future network and improvements
- Recommend policies for implementation
- Recommend changes to city regulations and standards
- Develop planning level cost estimates
- Prioritization and implementation plan with funding options
- Stakeholder and public engagement

General Cost Range:

Costs will vary depending upon the size of the community or activity center, the amount of stakeholder and public engagement, and data availability.

General costs for the scope items listed above should range from about \$20K to \$60K+.





Pedestrian Plans (Community Events)



General Scope:

Produce a plan to improve pedestrian safety, access, circulation, and connectivity for an area where community events are held or for a specific community event. The scope likely includes the following tasks:

- Identify and assess conditions of existing facilities at and around the site
- Identify event or event site programming
- Identify desired future conditions, goals, and objectives
- Identify pedestrian connections to the event site and from parking locations to the event site
- Identify inner circulation routing

General costs for the scope items listed above should range from about \$10K to \$30K+.

Parking Studies



General Scope:

Produce a document to inform the public and elected officials about different parking scenarios in a specific area, corridor, or business cluster, with reference to pedestrian activity and "sense of place". The scope likely includes the following tasks:

- Identify existing on- and off-street parking inventory
- Identify and analyze occupancy, duration, turn over, availability, demand, and peak demand
- Identify surpluses and deficits
- Conduct interviews and/or survey of business owners, visitors, and residents
- Review existing parking management, operations, technology, wayfinding, maintenance, pricing, as well as local policies and requirements

General costs for the scope items listed above should range from about \$10K to \$50K+.

Traffic Calming Studies



General Scope:

Produce a plan to reduce motor vehicle speeds on a targeted street, at an intersection, along a corridor, or within a defined area. The scope likely includes the following tasks:

- Collect and analyze traffic data including volumes, speeds, turning movements, etc.
- Collect and analyze existing physical conditions of street and development types
- Collect and analyze crash data
- Conduct interviews and/or surveys of property owners, stakeholders, etc.
- Identify needed traffic calming and the desired outcomes
- Identify options and develop recommendations
- Stakeholder and public engagement

General Cost Range:

Costs will vary depending upon length of corridor or number of areas, the amount of stakeholder and public engagement, and data availability.

General costs for the scope items listed above should range from about \$10K to \$50K+.



Zoning Code & Subdivision Regulations Updates



General Scope:

Revise existing municipal regulations that control and direct the development of property and the subdivision of land. These updates are to aid in creating an environment that promotes and enhances walking. The scope likely includes the following tasks:

- Identify purpose of update to regulations
- Review existing zoning code and subdivision regulations
- Develop gap analysis between existing regulations and desired regulations
- Draft revised regulations
- Stakeholder and public engagement



General Cost Range:

A complete update of zoning code and subdivision regulations generally costs in the range from about \$15K to \$30K+.

Educational Programs

- Creation of pedestrian plans for activity centers such as event venues, schools, or employment centers
- Studies or planning that will create/identify areas where walking/foot traffic will enhance the local economy
- Traffic calming studies
- Temporary demonstration projects that will introduce new walkability practices or project types to the region
- Other planning components such as market assessment, exploring financing options, creating multi-year phasing plans with associated costs
- Pedestrian plans for connecting activity centers

Bad Example: Plan a sidewalk between 183rd and 187th street.

Good Example: Plan for connecting 183rd and 187th Streets on Harlan Avenue so that residents in the Pine Hills neighborhood can safely walk to the Pine Hills Shopping Center. The plan will help determine whether to extend the sidewalk on the west side of Harlan Ave or construct a new facility between the neighborhood and Shopping Center on the east side, and will help to determine what types of crosswalks or other safety features may be appropriate. Engineering concerns and public input will both be considered. The plan will also examine the possible addition of trees and lighting along this route and extending to Maple Sugar Park on 188th Street. It will develop planning-level cost estimates or ranges for implementing different options.

The City of Rose Hill is committed to planning a bright future for residents and businesses. The City recently adopted a new zoning code, is creating a master plan for the largest city park, and is in the process of developing a new Comprehensive Plan to shape the future of the community. Rose Hill will harness this momentum by creating community-wide pedestrian plan that includes an assessment of the demand and feasibility of creating a pedestrian-friendly, walkable, corridor area surrounding the intersection of SW 170th Street and Rose Hill Road.

The Plan will identify strategies and projects for community-wide pedestrian connectivity including extensions to other regional cities. The plan will create alternatives for connecting neighborhoods, schools, parks, community facilities, and commercial centers. The hub of pedestrian activity is likely to be the commercial area surrounding the intersection of SW 170th Street and Rose Hill Road. Rose Hill will study the demand for and feasibility of creating a walkable area around this intersection and extending outward along the two major thoroughfares. The Plan will define an identity for the area, set a clear vision, and guide pedestrian accommodations, transportation options, parking, land use mix consistent with pedestrian development, and design guidelines. The plan will utilize a robust community and stakeholder engagement process to ensure the plan represents the community needs and desires.

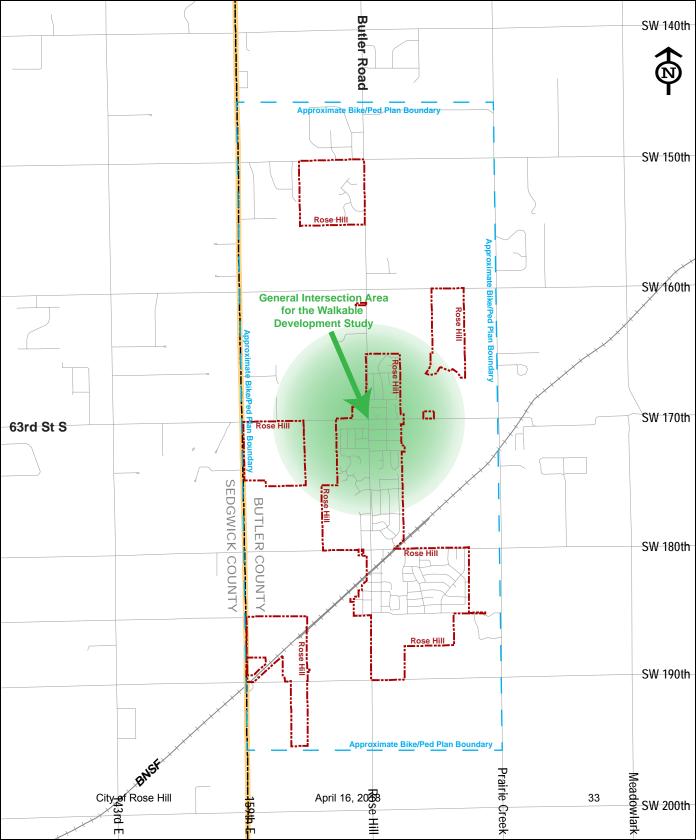

AGREEMENT

PARTIES: Rose Hill, KS, hereinafter referred to as the "Sponsor"

Wichita Area Metropolitan Planning Organization, hereinafter referred to as "WAMPO"

PURPOSE:

The Planning Walkable Places (here in after known as "PWP") program provides local governments with financial support to advance detailed planning and project development activities in support of MOVE2040's activity centers and corridors framework. Funds received will be used to advance detailed local planning in support of the <u>project application</u> as detailed in Exhibit A.

The program looks to facilitate the following objectives:

- Create pilot projects that can be evaluated by all member jurisdictions and members of the public.
- Enhance community identity by helping to create core areas and Main Streets with distinctive characteristics.
- Promote pedestrian safety.
- Enhance or restore the character and charm of traditionally walkable areas.
- Support a "sense of community" in small and large cities.
- Enhance the quality of community of events and help keep up with rapidly increasing rates of attendance.
- Support efforts to enhance economic vitality and tourism that rely on foot traffic for attractions and retail.

EFFECTIVE

The parties mutually agree to Articles I, II, III, and IV in accordance with this Agreement from the ____ day of ______, 2017 until the 31st day of December, 2019.

ARTICLE I

SPONSOR AGREES:

- 1. To fund their portion of the PWP program's required local match of \$15,000 with a one-time payment upon delivery of an invoice from WAMPO;
- 2. To pay a one-time administrative fee to WAMPO of approximately 1.5% of the federal award to cover a portion of the indirect services fee charged to WAMPO by its fiscal agent;
- 3. That any change order or request for additional services must be submitted through WAMPO to the contracted consultant. If the resulting change order or request for additional services requires additional funding, payment shall be the responsibility of the Sponsor;
- 4. To pay for any ineligible expense that is incurred on this project that is not reimbursed to

- WAMPO by the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT);
- 5. To provide a project manager and coordinate the consultant team;
- 6. To participate in the PWP program management and provide WAMPO all required technical assistance, data and any other necessary information needed to successfully manage and comply with federal requirements regarding the PWP project;
- 7. Agree to include designated WAMPO project liaison in study advisory committee; and
- 8. To provide a selection committee to review consultant vendor proposals, interview prospective consultant vendors, and make final selection of vendor.

ARTICLE II

WAMPO AGREES:

- 1. To provide project liaison and project management;
- 2. To administer awarded Planning Walkable Places funding of \$60,000, unless state or federal funding sources withdraw funding;
- 3. To coordinate and conduct consultant selection process to meet state and federal procurement requirements in the use of federal funds that includes but is not limited to debarment and Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) requirements;
- 4. To provide oversight of federal requirements that governs the use of federal funds in connection with the PWP program; and
- 5. To administer consultant invoicing and reimbursement process per state and federal guidelines.

ARTICLE III

BOTH PARTIES MUTUALLY AGREE:

- 1. That this Agreement and all contracts entered into under provisions of this Agreement shall be binding upon the City of Rose Hill, Kan. and WAMPO; and
- 2. That no third party beneficiaries are intended to be created by this Agreement, nor do the parties herein authorize anyone not a party to this Agreement to maintain a suit for damages pursuant to the terms or provisions of this Agreement.

ARTICLE IV

- 1. Consultant Service Agreement. Unless otherwise agreed to by the parties in writing, WAMPO's agreement with any Consultant for the PWP program is attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit B; subject to the following revisions to Exhibit B:
 - a. Section 9C regarding Copyrights and Ownership of Deliverables "All rights, title and interest in and to the Deliverables, including copyright thereto, shall vest in WAMPO and the City of Rose Hill, Kansas, who shall be deemed authors of the Deliverables."
 - b. Section 14 D regarding Additional Insured "WAMPO and the City of Rose Hill, Kansas shall be included as an additional insured under Consultant's furnished insurance (except Workers' Compensation Insurance)…"
 - c. Section 23 regarding Indemnification for Claims and Liability "...Consultant agrees to protect, indemnify, defend and hold harmless WAMPO and the City of Rose Hill, Kansas..."

2. Audits.

- (a) For purposes of this Section, "Records" shall mean any document, book, paper, photograph, map, sound recordings or other material, regardless of physical form or characteristics, made or received in connection with this Contract, the Consultant Services Agreement and all Contract amendments and renewals.
- (b) WAMPO shall maintain and retain all Records for a term of five (5) years that shall begin after the expiration or termination of this Contract and all Contract amendments. Sponsor shall have a right to examine or audit all Records, and WAMPO shall provide access to Sponsor of all Records upon ten (10) days written notice from the Sponsor.
- (c) The books, documents and records of WAMPO in connection with this Contract shall be made available to the WAMPO's Auditor, and the person or entity administering this Contract within ten (10) days after the written request is made.
- 3. Cash Basis Law. Pursuant to the Kansas Cash Basis Law, Sponsor is obligated only to make payments under this Agreement as may be lawfully made from funds budgeted and appropriated for the purposes as set forth in this Agreement during Sponsor's current budget year. In the event Sponsor does not so budget and appropriate the funds, the parties acknowledge and agree that they shall be relieved from all obligations, without penalty, under this Agreement.
- 4. Termination. WAMPO and Sponsor each respectively reserves the right to terminate this Agreement at any time without cause by giving the other not less than thirty (30) days written notice of termination. If the City terminates the Agreement prior to completion of services, the City shall compensate WAMPO for all services satisfactorily completed as of the date of WAMPO's receipt of the termination notice. Compensation shall not include anticipatory profit or consequential damages, neither of which will be allowed.
